Demand - Supply of Workers from DOLE Administrative Records: 4th Quarter 2009

Administrative data generated by DOLE agencies from their operations showed a decrease in demand for local jobs based on job vacancy postings at the Phil-Jobnet and an increase in overseas demand based on approved job orders at the POEA. Job openings posted at the Phil-Jobnet declined by 19.9 percent while the number of approved job orders for land-based workers was up by 22.8 percent between the period 3rd quarter 2009 to 4th quarter of 2009.

Meanwhile, there was an overall increase in labor supply consisting of applicants registered at the Phil-Jobnet; professionals licensed by the Professional Regulation Commission; TESDA assessed and certified workers; maritime trainees; and graduates of OWWA programs and services on education and training.

I. MANPOWER DEMAND

1. Phil-Jobnet

The Phil-Jobnet posted a total of 166,296 vacancies for the period July - September 2009 or an average of 55,432 vacancies per month. This represents a decrease of 11.7 percent over the vacancies posted for the past quarter. The demand consisted mostly of job openings for Clerks, Professionals, Technicians and Associate Professionals, whose combined total accounted for 84.4 percent of the total vacancy figure. The remaining 15.6 percent were distributed among Laborers and Unskilled Workers; Service Workers & Shop & Market Sales Workers; Trades and Related Workers; Plant & Machine Operators and Assemblers; Officials of Government & Special Interest Organization, Corporate Executives, Managers, Managing Proprietors and Supervisors; and Special Occupations.





The Labor Market Monitor is a quarterly publication of the Bureau of Local Employment (BLE) that tracks the changes in the supply and demand for professionals, skilled and unskilled workers as viewed from administrative data generated by DOLE agencies involved in skills training and certification, professional regulation, employment facilitation and overseas employment. This is a collaborative undertaking of the DOLE family of agencies (TESDA, POEA, OWWA, PRC, MTC, ILAS, BLES and BLE), that integrates in one publication key performance indicators on labor market supply and demand. It likewise captures critical and emerging occupations for the purpose of labor market signaling and as basis for timely and meaningful policy and program interventions.

By location, vacancy posting for local hiring outnumbered that of overseas job openings, accounting for 79.3 percent of the total vacancies reported during the reference period.

Majority of the demand for Professional Nurses were for overseas deployment, while the rest of the vacancies included in the top ten were, largely, for local employment.

There was noticeably a sustained demand for Call Center Agent, Customer Service Assistant, Professional Nurse, Technical Support Staff, and Information Technology (IT) Specialist whose demand was consistently included in the top 10 from the first quarter to the fourth quarter of 2009, Meanwhile, demand for pharmacist was noticed in the last quarter of 2009 and the majority of the demand was for local employment. This can be attributed to the thriving small and medium scale pharmacy/drugstore business which requires a licensed pharmacist to operate.

2. Overseas Demand Based on Approved Job Orders

Demand for Land-Based Workers

A total of 147,503 job orders were approved during the fourth quarter 2009. The bulk of these overseas job openings were for Service Workers (36.3%) and Production & Related Workers, Transport Equipment Operators & Laborers (32.1%), followed by Professional Technical and Related Workers (20.9%).

Of the approved job orders of 147,503, almost thirty percent (29.71%) or 43,826 were processed leaving a balance of 103,677 (70.3%) unfilled job orders.

Occupations/skills which consistently remained in the list of the top 10 unfilled job orders were Household Service Worker; Professional Nurse; Production & Related Worker (NEC); Wireman Electrical; Plumbmer and Fitters; Waiter, Bartender & Related Worker; Welders and Flame Cutters.

The required skills were mostly for the Middle East markets except for nurses where there was also a need in the United States of America, the United Kingdom, and Canada. Meanwhile, job openings for Production Workers were concentrated in Taiwan.

Demand for Sea-Based Workers

The latest available data on the demand for sea-based workers still covered the period 1st qtr. 2008 with preliminary deployment figures reported at 65,154.

3. Prospective Overseas Demand Based on POLO Intelligence Reports

The Philippine Overseas Labor Offices (POLOs) reported the continuous demand for Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) in the Eastern Region, particularly in the construction and service sectors. The skills requirements in the said foreign markets remained relatively the same compared with the previous year.

II. MANPOWER SUPPLY

1. Registered Professionals

As of the 4th Quarter of 2009, the cumulative total of professionals registered with the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) stood at 2,985,740.

Professional Teachers were on top of the list accounting for the majority or 34.9 percent of the total number of registered professionals. Second in rank were Nurses (19.8%), followed by Midwives (5.3%).

Of the top ten professions, four (4) belonged to the health professional group, and two (2) belonged to the maritime group and respectively these are Nurse, Midwife, Physician, Pharmacist, Marine Deck Officers, and Marine Engine Officers.

2. Phil-Jobnet Registry

A total of 21,221 job applicants registered at the Phil-Jobnet during the fourth quarter of 2009. Majority were Service Workers and Shop and Market Sales Workers with a proportionate share of 20.0 percent, followed by Laborers and Unskilled Workers with 18.7 percent,





and Clerks at 18.2 percent. Altogether, they accounted more than half (56.9%) of the total registrants looking for work during the period in review.

A large number of Production Workers/Factory Workers and Production Machine Operators registered during the 4th quarter of 2009. A fraction of them were still part of the displaced workers from the manufacturing (electronics and semi-conductors) and export sectors due to the global financial crisis that hit the country during the last quarter of 2008. Aside from Production Workers and Production Machine Operators, the following were also consistently included in the top ten list of Phil-Jobnet registrants: Service Crew, Cashier, Nurse, Sales Clerk, Salesman/Salelady and Data Encoder.

3. TESDA Voc-Tech Graduates/ Assesed & Certified Workers

Voc-Tech Graduates

The number of TVET top 10 graduates by qualification title during the fourth quarter totalled to 126,942 of which seventy four percent (94,005) were included in the top 5 qualification titles. During the same period, the top five TESDA programs in terms of number of TVET graduates by sectors were Finishing Course for Call Center Agents NC II, followed by Computer Programming NC II, Automotive Servicing NC II, Barista NC II and Shielded Metal Arc (SMAW) NCI

The biggest number of workers assessed and certified belonged to the Tourism (Hotel & Restaurant) sectors. It likewise registered the certification rate of 99.89% closely followed by the Maritime sector with a certification rate at 96.09%, and by Health, Social & Other Community Development Services with 92.52%.

4. Graduates of OWWA Programs & Services on Education and Training

During the period October to December 2009, a total of 18,254 graduated under the short term course, college degree and elementary/high school program of the Overseas Workers Welfare Administration (OWWA), down by 1.4 percent from the 3rd quarter 2009 figure of 20,855. Majority of its graduates (69.0%) were beneficiaries of the short-term course on Language Training and Culture Familiarization followed by Computer Literacy (Microsoft Tulay Project) and by Seafarers' Upgrading Program (SUP) with 22 percent and 6 percent.

5. Maritime Training and Assessment

For the 4th quarter 2009, 4,037 training certificates have been issued by the National Maritime Polytechnic (NMP) to Filipino merchant marine officers, ratings, cadets, maritime faculties, trainers, and other personnel in the maritime industry.

A total of 1,743 seafarers/trainees were trained and around 183 ratings were assessed for Performance Assessment (conduct of practical examination) and 28 ratings were for Portfolio Assessment (evaluation of documentary evidence).
